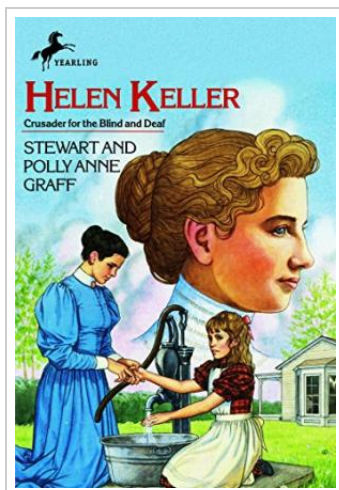




Helen Keller: Crusader for the Blind and Deaf (Paperback)
